





CHILLI – January to December 2022

Spices are aromatic vegetable substances used for the seasoning of foods. Among them, chilli is one important spice used all over the world in one form or the other. Indian chillies have been dominating the international chilli market. India is not only the largest producer but also the largest consumer and exporter of chilli in the world. Chilli alone contributes 42% of the total spice export quantity of the country and is predominantly exported to countries like China, Vietnam, Thailand, Sri Lanka, Indonesia and Malaysia. Indian chilli is considered to be world-famous for important commercial qualities of colour and pungency levels. India is the largest producer with 1.98 million tonnes and contributes 43% of world chilli production, followed by China, Ethiopia, Thailand, Pakistan and Bangladesh.




Figure 2: State wise Chilli production in India ('000 tonnes)

In India during 2021-22, Andhra Pradesh tops the list in dry chilli production of 4.07 lakh tonnes covered under 2.25 lakh ha with 1809 kg/ha productivity followed by Telangana, Madhya Pradesh, Karnataka and West Bengal. State-wise chilli production in India is presented in Figure 2. Guntur chilli yard being the largest chilli market in Asia influences the domestic and international prices of chillies. Guntur district in Andhra Pradesh alone produces 15% of all the chillies produced in India and the state of Andhra Pradesh as a whole contributes 26 % of India's chilli production (des.ap.gov.in, 2021). There are more than 400 different varieties of chillies found all over the world. The major chilli growing districts in AP are Guntur, Prakasam, Kurnool and Krishna. Teja, Byadgi, DD Best, 341, 273, 334 etc., are reported as premium varieties and preferred by exporters.

According to the Final estimates of the Government of Andhra Pradesh, chilli production is 4.07 lakh tonnes grown in an area of 2.25 lakh ha with a productivity of 1809 kg/ha during 2021-22. According to 1st advance estimates during 2022-23, chillies was grown in 1.69 lakh hectares with a production of 6.94 lakh tonnes and productivity was 4109 kg/ha.

As per some private sources, the data given is compiled in Table 1, depicts that the production has decreased from 2017-18 to 2021-22 and it was observed that, the total demand (13.38 lakh tonnes) for chilli was easily met by the total supply (16.54 lakh tonnes).

China was the major importer of Indian chillies, followed by USA, Thailand, Sri Lanka, Indonesia, Bangladesh, Malaysia and UAE. Chilli exports to these major ten countries account for 90 per cent of total India's chilli export, which is shown in Table 2.

Table 3 reveals that the per cent share of chilli exports to total spices exports has increased from 19 to 42 per cent between 1993 and 2020, and similarly, the per cent share of chilli imports to total spices imports has decreased from 1.27 to 0.51 per cent from 2000 to 2018. The results reveal that in overall spices exports, the major share is contributed by chilli crop, which in turn contributes to the nation's GDP.

The details of the comparison of the area and production of chilli concerning the bifurcation of Andhra Pradesh and Telangana states have been given in Table 4. It is observed that, from 2010-11 to 2021-22 the area has increased from 1.95 to 2.25 lakh ha and production also decreased from 6.38 to 4.07 lakh tonnes, which is due to decrease in the yield from 3265 to 1809 kg/ha. In 2021-22, chilli crop was infected with thrips damage.

The inter-district comparison of Andhra Pradesh for chilli (2020-21) is shown in Table 5. It is observed that, Guntur district ranks top in both area and production. Among the 13 districts of Andhra Pradesh, six districts, namely Guntur, Prakasam, Kurnool, Krishna, Ananthapur and East Godavari, cover 96 per cent of acreage and 98 per cent of production.

Chilli Price Outlook:

From 1st January 2022 to 31st December 2022, Red Chilli supply in the Guntur market remained around 593,010 MT as compared to 740,970 MT same period last year, down by 19.97% due to high demand and lower availability of premium quality during the last season.

The arrival scenario of chilli in Andhra Pradesh and Telangana is shown in Table 6. In November 2022, the chilli arrivals in Guntur market were 12.75 lakh bags and in December 2022 arrivals decreased to 8.35 lakh bags.

Seasonal indices measure the monthly per cent deviation from the average arrivals and prices in 2022. The seasonal indices of chilli arrivals and prices from Guntur AMC presented in Table 7 show that the arrivals are highest in the months of March and February and the prices are highest in the months of October and November. The average monthly prices of the normal variety were Rs 23227, 23071, 24313 and 22855, the prices of the special variety were Rs. 21712, 25624, 22371 and 20265 for the months of September, October, November and December 2021 respectively in Guntur AMC.




Figure 3: Average monthly prices of Chilli in Andhra Pradesh

As per the information shared by Agricultural Marketing Intelligence Centre (AMIC), ANGRAU, in AP and Telangana, Red Chilli standing crop affected by virus, farmers are uprooting their crop. Buyers were reported inactive in the spot market as new crop supply slowly started in Guntur, Warangal and Khammam spot market. Due to adverse weather conditions (drop in temperature and cloudy weather) overall arrivals reported down in the Red Chilli markets. Teja variety prices were trading up on fresh export demand from Bangladesh and Malaysia also currently traded lower than other Chilli varieties. Overall exports reported down by 26.70% from the same period last year as a result of lower availability of premium quality, Sri Lanka economic crisis, lockdown in China during early months of the current year and also Russia-Ukraine war has affected the exports. In Andhra Pradesh as on 28th December 2022, 2.22 lakh hectares of chillies was sown compared to 1.84 lakh hectares last year (apagrisnet.gov.in). The average monthly price of chilli in Andhra Pradesh is shown in Figure 3.

Under these circumstances, the AMIC, ANGRAU, is here with providing the latest information with regard to the forecast price range of Rs. 16,000-18,000 per quintal for the normal variety and Rs. 18,000-20,000 per quintal for the special variety of chilli in this Rabi marketing/harvesting season 2022-23.

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
